

You(th) Have Rights understanding trespassing



What is trespassing?

Entering or staying at a location without permission or when it's against the law. Trespassing can happen when you stay in a public place after hours or when you refuse to leave a building after you have been told to leave.

What can happen if I get caught trespassing?

Youth can be given a citation or petition to go to juvenile court. The prosecutor may decide a diversion program is best to address the situation. Trespassing is a misdemeanor or gross misdemeanor for adults. It can be punished by up to 90 days in jail and/or \$1,000 fine.

What are examples of trespassing?

- Going to a school when you are not an enrolled student or don't have a valid reason (attending a school event or meeting)
- Sleeping in a park after it is closed
- Going to visit a friend at a public housing building when you were previously told you can't be on the property
- Refusing to leave a library after staff ask you to leave
- Going onto a construction site without permission
- Going through police tape onto a crime scene
- Letting your dog poo on your neighbor's lawn
