For more than 45 years Tubman has worked to advance opportunities for change so that every person can experience safety, hope, and healing. As a multi-service organization, we help an average of 20,000 people per year of all ages, genders, and cultural backgrounds who are facing relationship violence, sexual assault, exploitation, homelessness, addiction, mental health challenges, and other forms of trauma.

WHAT WE DO

Our comprehensive services include safety planning; a 24/7 crisis and resource help line; shelter, transitional housing, and rapid rehousing; legal services including Orders for Protection and attorney representation; mental and chemical health assessment, treatment, and support; parenting education and child care; youth outreach, mobile case management, and in-school violence prevention education; support groups, job readiness and financial education; community education; and professional training for service providers.



Chrysalis Women's Collective forms to offer support groups, chemical health services, and childcare.

Harriet Tubman Women's Shelter opens as the third battered women's shelter in the country.



Legal advocacy and Orders for Protection in Washington County begin.

Family Violence Network opens volunteer safe homes for victims and their children in the East Metro.

Services expand into suburban Ramsey County. School-1990 based violence prevention education begins.

The new Harriet Tubman Shelter opens in Minneapolis with a public address, taking the issues of domestic violence 1995 out of the shadows and signaling a commitment to engage the whole community.

New services begin, including transitional housing; Jobs, Education, and Finance program; Healthcare for the 1996 Homeless; and a shared parenting program for kids affected by divorce.

A cutting-edge mental health program for women, 1997 Dialectical Behavioral Therapy, begins.

Holistic counseling launches for men using violence, 1999 leading to nationwide recognition, including a television special by Oprah.

Harriet Tubman Center and Family Violence Network merge to form Tubman Family Alliance.

The Co-Occurring Program begins for women experiencing both mental and chemical health issues.

Tubman Family Alliance and Chrysalis, A Center for 2007 Women merge to become Tubman.

Harriet Tubman Center East in Maplewood is acquired from the Sisters of St. Paul's Monastery.

The Lethality Assessment Project in Washington County launches. Tubman is awarded research and change grant to improve services for victims of violence with brain 2009 injuries. A multidisciplinary Legal Think Tank is initiated in Washington and suburban Ramsey counties to improve the legal system's response to domestic violence.

The ElderCare Rights Alliance joins Tubman and incorporates agency-wide expertise in working with older 2011 victims of crime.

Tubman's text line launches for youth and young 2012 adults.

Inspiring Youth, a new partnership to serve at-risk youth, 2014 begins with public health and Minneapolis public schools.

The Joint Prosecution Unit launches in suburban Ramsey County. The Safe Journeys program opens to provide 2015 housing and in-depth supportive services to young victims of violence and exploitation.

> In partnership with a community-led task force, Tubman develops protocols, trains volunteers, and opens a drop-in center for homeless youth at Tubman East. Tubman's shelter program begins to serve adult male victims. The agency commissions a forensic engineering review of structural issues impacting Harriet Tubman Center West in Minneapolis.

Tubman convenes a Facilities Task Force to identify options and make a recommendation to Tubman's Board of Directors regarding the future of Harriet Tubman Center West. The Board of Directors unanimously votes to sell the building in order to strengthen long term organizational stability and increase investment in services. Tubman conducted its first biannual Employee Engagement Survey in order to assess morale, develop action plans to strengthen Tubman's culture, and utilize feedback to guide the agency's ongoing work in areas of wellness and diversity.

Tubman establishes the Freedom Fund to provide clients with emergency cash assistance for tangible needs while 2018 accessing other life-changing services.

The NorthStar Youth Outreach Center moves to Maplewood Mall for increased community access.

Tubman sells Harriet Tubman Center West to Minnesota 2019 Adult and Teen Challenge, another nonprofit serving the community.

> The Racial Justice Collective and BIPOC Collective are created and led by staff, to center inclusivity in our work. Increased investments in technology are made in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, allowing Tubman to continue serving clients in various ways. Attorney representation services expand in Washington County. Tubman Chrysalis Center in Minneapolis is fully renovated to create a welcoming and trauma-informed space for the people we serve.

Increased investments result in more than triple the amount of people served 2021 in our community housing programs. Tubman provides 250% more emergency financial assistance through our Freedom Fund. The Inspiring Youth Program expands. Tubman's Racial Equity Plan is created.
